BROAD BAND –Tolland Broadband Update -POLE SURVEY WORK November 17, 2020 Pole survey work: Verizon has hired Pike Construction to survey the Utility poles in Tolland; there are 1130 poles being surveyed. Surveys began November 12, and the surveyors can complete about 150 poles per day. Survey work is weather dependent and can be completed within 3-4 weeks. Work on Schoolhouse Road continues: Witch Equipment workers say they are past the ledge they encountered in the last 3-4 weeks. The COA's Outreach worker, Ann Skibski, continues to be in contact with seniors in town to assess their needs, update them on available services and activities as well as assist them in obtaining needed services. assistance in meeting

Our Community Food Pantry in Southwick serves Tolland, Southwick and Granville. The holidays are always a busy time for them. They provide food assistance to those in need. Tolland has always supported this program. If you would like more information call (413) 569-9876.

Upon the recommendation of the Council on Aging (COA) the Board of Selectmen, on October 19, voted, subject to approval at a town meeting, to establish a program to allow persons over the age of 60 to volunteer to provide services to the town. In exchange, the town shall reduce the real property tax obligation of the person on his/her tax bill. This shall be an abatement. The rate of the abatement a person shall receive or credited with, shall be at the current minimum wage and shall not exceed \$1,500 in a given tax year. This is authorized under Part I, Title IX, Chapter 59, Section K of the general Laws of Massachusetts. The COA believes the program will be beneficial to the town and may provide some help for its senior citizens.

The vote to approve this program will be at the next town meeting. Dave Spidal of the COA will make a brief presentation and answer any question. If you have questions prior to that meeting, you can email them to councilonaging@tolland-ma.com and a member of the COA will contact you to answer your question(s)

The COA received a shipment of 500 face masks and they are available at no cost for any resident in Town Hall. Call Margaret at (413) 569-9876 X 101 to get come. Or stop in town hall Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday between 10 AM and 2 PM and be sure to wear a mask.

During October the Southwick – Tolland- Granville Regional School District had the highest percentage of students participating in in-person learning in Western Massachusetts. The District and the teachers union had agreed that if Hampden County reached a 3% positivity rate the district would pivot to a remote learning model. The Hampden County Positivity Rate reached 3.74%, therefore, starting Monday, November 9, 2020, the district shifted to a full remote teaching model. The district strongly believe that there is no replacement for in-person learning and the connections between students, teachers and peers. As of this writing the schools are still in full remote but looking forward to resuming in person learning.

The Tolland Library is open and doing business albeit with reduced hours. The current operating hours are Wednesday: 3:00 pm to 6:00 pm and Saturday: 10:00 am to 12:00 pm. All visitors must wear a mask.

On the first Wednesday of every month, except January and February, a Foot Nurse comes to the Otis Town Hall, to take care of our feet. She is a private nurse and the charge for her services is \$40.00.the Tolland Council on Aging supplements \$15.00 of this charge for Tolland Residents. You must make an appointment through the center at 413 269 0100 x107. She will also take walk-ins when possible. As of this writing, Otis has closed their Town Hall so this program is suspended.

Folks often have a temporary need for durable medical equipment like crutches, walkers, wheel chairs, etc. The Otis COA, the Westfield Senior Center and the Southwick Senior Center have an inventory of durable medical equipment that they will loan you. On August 22 the COA, with funding from the Cultural Arts Commission and set up y the Tolland DPW, hosted a Concert On the Green featuring Davis Bates with his stories and songs for all ages. Twenty-eight folks attended (less than the thirty allowed by the Governor), wore their masks and spread out over the green. It was an enjoyable evening with a surprise visit by a flock of six domestic turkeys – they appeared to enjoy the music too. We are planning on having more of these concerts next summer.

Tolland Broadband Update

November 17, 2020

Since my July update, Comcast has begun the underground construction on Schoolhouse Road and has approximately one mile left to complete. Ledge and rock have slowed the process, and they continue to work to complete the three-mile project. Witch Equipment workers say they are past the ledge they encountered in the last 3-4 weeks

Eversource and Verizon have started work on estimates for the make-ready work on the utility poles. We do not have the granular data to measure and report their progress at this time; this information will be available quarterly when the estimates are completed and the work on the poles begins.

To reiterate from my last update, we remain in the make-ready phase of construction, the component of the network build with the longest timetable. Comcast has completed the mapping of all utility poles in Tolland, completed, and submitted the applications for the pole licenses to the respective utilities, Eversource and Verizon. Eversource and Verizon has processed the applications and begun surveys to determine the position on the pole where Comcast will attach and a cost estimate for each pole. Pole survey work: Verizon has hired Pike Construction to survey the Utility poles in Tolland; there are 1130 poles being surveyed. Surveys began November 12, and the surveyors can complete about 150 poles per day. Survey work is weather dependent and can be completed within 3-4 weeks. The pole work will be completed based on the estimates and scope of work for each.

Comcast is ordering equipment and entering addresses into their system, being ready to mobilize when the make-ready work is complete. The estimated completion of the network is fifteen to twenty-one months away. Peter Larkin and his staff at MBI meet bi-weekly with Comcast and the utilities discussing all towns under construction in Western Mass.

YOU MAY QUALIFY FOR CASH or CREDIT FROM THE STATE IF YOU PAY RENT OR PROPERTY TAXES

The Massachusetts "CIRCUIT BREAKER" TAX PROGRAM is for qualifying persons age 65 or over whose property tax (or 25% of rent) exceeds 10% of their annual gross income. You may be eligible even if you receive a property tax exemption through your city/town.

Whether or not you owe taxes, you may be eligible for <u>cash or a tax credit of up to \$1,150 this tax year</u> - even if you did not file Massachusetts state income tax forms. This benefit equals the amount that your property tax (plus 50% of your Water and Sewer Bill*) or 25% of your rent exceeds 10% of your income up to a maximum benefit amount that varies by year.

To obtain the benefit, you must file for the 2020 tax year beginning in January 2021.

You may also file retroactively for any benefits you could have qualified for in the past three years. *The maximum credit you may receive for tax year 2020 is \$1,150; 2019 is \$1,130; 2018 is \$1,100; and 2017 is \$1,080.* The deadline for retroactive filing for tax year 2017 is April 15, 2021.

See if you qualify:

- 1. You must be Age 65 or over by the end of tax year for which you are filing.
- 2. Your <u>Income</u> must not exceed the following (Including Social Security, and other income not ordinarily taxed in Massachusetts.)

Income for tax year	2017	2018	2019	2020
Single	57,000	58,000	60,000	61,000
Head of household	72,000	73,000	75,000	76,000
Married, filing jointly	86,000	88,000	90,000	92,000

- 3. Your **<u>primary residence</u>**, owned or rented, must be in Massachusetts. Public Housing and subsidized renters are not eligible.
- 4. The <u>assessed value</u> of your home must not be greater than: **2017 -** \$747,000; **2018 -** \$778,000; **2019 -** \$808,000; **2020 -** \$848,000
- 5. <u>Homeowners:</u> Your property tax plus 50% of your water and sewer bill* must exceed 10% of your income. Multi-acre property owners: only one acre plus your home count toward your qualifying assessment. Consult your local assessor to compute assessment for application.

Renters: 25% of your annual rent must exceed 10% of your gross income.

Even if you don't normally file with the state, you are most likely due a check or tax credit from the Dept. of Revenue if you meet the above criteria. If you have an accountant, ask for help with this year and /or previous years.

ANOSOGNOSIA

In the following analysis, the French Professor Bruno Dubois, Director of the Institute of Memory and Alzheimer's Disease (IMMA) at La Pitie-Salpetriere-Paris Hospitals, addresses the subject in a rather reassuring way:

"If anyone is aware of his memory problems, he does not have Alzheimer's"

I forget the names of families.

I do not remember where I put some things.

It often happens in people 60 years and older that they complain that they lack memory.

"The information is always in the brain, it is the 'processor' that is lacking." This is "Anasognosia" or temporary forgetfulness. Half of the people 60 and older have some symptoms that are due to age rather than disease.

The most common cases are: forgetting the name of a person, going to a room in the house and not remembering why we were going there, a blank memory for a movie title or actor, an actress, a waste of time searching where we left our glasses or keys.

After 60 years, most people have such difficulty, which indicates that it is not a disease but rather a characteristic due to the passage of years. Many people are concerned about these oversights hence the importance of the following statement:

"Those who are conscious of being forgetful have no serious problem of memory."

"Those who suffer from a memory illness or Alzheimer's, are not aware of what is happening."

Professor Bruno Dubois reassures the majority of people concerned about their oversights: "The more we complain about memory loss, the less likely we are to suffer from memory sickness."


